NO. 2 DUKE 82, NO. 7 GEORGIA TECH 52

Defending ACC Tournament champion Duke improved to 35-7 in games played at the Greensboro Coliseum with Friday night's quarterfinal win over Georgia Tech.

Duke head coach Joanne P. McCallie improved to 14-3 in ACC Tournament games with Friday night's win. McCallie's .824 ACC Tournament winning percentage is the league's best all-time. McCallie owns a combined 38-12 record in all conference postseason tournaments in which she has coached (North Atlantic Conference, America East Conference, Big Ten and ACC) for a winning percentage of .760.

Duke improved to 6-0 all-time vs. Georgia Tech in ACC Tournament play and to 59-7 in the series overall.

The Blue Devils improved to 3-0 all-time vs. the No. 7 seed in NCAA Tournament games.

Duke's 13 blocked shots set an ACC Tournament single-game record. Three teams, most recently the Blue Devils against NC State in the 2012 quarterfinals, shared the previous record of 12.

ACC Defensive Player of the Year Elizabeth Williams blocked five shots for the Blue Devils, giving her 92 for the season. Duke's opponents this season have 78 blocks combined.

Duke limited Georgia Tech to a 23.9 percent shooting night from the floor, the second lowest in ACC Tournament history. The Yellow Jackets were 17-of-71 on the night.

With one made 3-point shot on Friday night, Duke's Tricia Liston tied her own school record of 80 made treys in a season, which she set a year ago.

With her team-high 19 points and 10 rebounds, the Blue Devils' Haley Peters recorded her fifth double-double of the season and the 17th of her career.

Duke freshman Oderah Chidom's game-high 13 rebounds were one off her career high set Nov. 30 against Kansas.

Georgia Tech's leading scorer in the ACC Tournament, Kaela Davis, completed the Tournament with an average of 22 points and four rebounds. Against Duke, Davis had 16 points and four rebounds. Nine points came on 3-point baskets. Davis has made at least one 3-pointer in 27 of 31 contests this season. Davis has scored in double figures in 28 of 31 games this season.

Tyaunna Marshall was the Jackets' second leading scorer in the tournament, as she averaged 21.5 points and seven rebounds per game. Marshall had 17 points and four rebounds in Friday's loss. Marshall has scored in double figures in 30 of 31 games this season.
