NO. 6 NORTH CAROLINA 69, NO. 11 WAKE FOREST 65

The power at the Greensboro Coliseum went out at 9:46 p.m. Thursday evening with 16:19 remaining on the game clock and Wake Forest leading 39-34. Lights were restored and play resumed after 23 minutes.

North Carolina's comeback from 12 points down to defeat Wake Forest in Thursday night's second-round game was the third-largest halftime deficit overcome by a winning team in an ACC Women's Basketball Tournament game. The Tar Heels staged the second largest halftime comeback in the 2013 semifinals, when they wiped out a 14-point deficit in a win over Maryland.

North Carolina staged a 16-0 run during Thursday night's game that spanned from the final second of the first half until the 15:05 mark of the second half. During that 4:56 span, the Tar Heels went from a 39-25 deficit to a 41-39 lead.

Tonight's win for North Carolina is its 58th win in ACC Tournament history, which is the most for any ACC program. Overall, the Tar Heels are 58-27 (.682) in ACC Tournament play.

Wake Forest junior Dearica Hamby averaged 27 points and 12 rebounds in the Demon Deacons' two ACC Tournament games, including a 29-point, 8-rebound effort in Thursday night's game. Chelsea Douglas scored 20 points in both of Wake Forest's 2014 ACC Tournament outings.

North Carolina held Wake Forest to 23-of-52 shooting (.444 percent) in this evening's game. When the Tar Heels' opponent shoot less than 50 percent from the field, UNC is 23-6 overall this season.

This is the first time this season that North Carolina has had just one player score in double digits.

The No. 6 seed now holds an 8-2 edge over the No. 11 seed in ACC Tournament meetings.

North Carolina is now 7-1 vs. Wake Forest in the ACC Women's Tournament.
